2022-23 School Overview

Saratoga Elementary School has been a center of public education for the Saratoga community since 1854. We strive to be a caring school community that meets the whole child's needs by providing academic and enrichment opportunities that foster lifelong learning.

We do this by providing rigorous standards-based instruction alongside data-driven tiered support systems and well-developed parent and community partnerships. Students develop as mathematicians through the Eureka Math program, which develops foundational skills in operational mathematics and builds fluency with multiple problem-solving approaches. We are also continuing to grow workshop model based reading instruction using Lucy Calkins Units of Study Reading and Writing curriculum. In addition to the Unit of Study, we also adopted Foundations for Kindergarten through 2nd grade. Last year we launched TWIG Science to provide all students access to Next Generation Science Standards. All students in K-5 have access to Chromebooks. Students have hands-on learning through Makerspace and Science Lab projects. Parent and community partners include the Saratoga Educational Foundation, the Saratoga Elementary Parent-Teacher Association, Project Cornerstone, and the Saratoga Alumni Association. These groups are critical partners who support student enrichment classes, hands-on science labs, fine arts, physical education instruction, library, and character education.

Students, parents, staff, continue to work together to ensure each student receives a challenging, balanced, and integrated educational program in a safe and caring environment.

2022-23 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

All instructional materials in the core curriculum of Saratoga Union School District are aligned with the California Content Standards and Frameworks. SUSD adheres to CA Education Code and AB 1246, which gives school districts freedom, decision-making, and choice in selecting instructional materials, and requires: implementing the California Common Core State Standards; equal access to current curriculum materials; change in the adoption cycle; local school districts can choose their adoption review process, and classroom teachers will be a major contributor in local adoption processes.

SUSD students have access to standards-based instructional materials, as per EC Section 60119(c)(1), which states that sufficient textbooks or instructional materials mean "each pupil, including English Learners, has a standards-aligned textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home. This paragraph does not require two sets of textbooks or instructional materials for each pupil." This specifically applies to four subject areas: reading/language arts, mathematics, science, and history-social science.

A Public Hearing for 2022-2023 Sufficiency or Insufficiency of Textbooks and Instructional Materials was opened on September 2022 and closed in October 2022, as required by Education Code 60119. The purpose of the public hearing is to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution 452.9-17, which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Saratoga Elementary School's original facilities were built in 1854; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Various improvements are needed throughout the year as identified. The exterior of the school was repainted in the summer of 2021. One-touch faucets were installed in all bathrooms in 2020, hand sanitizers in all classrooms, the school office and in the multi-purpose rooms, and all HVAC filters were changed to MERV 13 filters to address COVID19 safety measures. The playground areas were re-striped in 2021. The main building and classroom wing received all new metal roof replacements in summer of 2022. The remainder of the school roofs are planned for replacement in summer 2023.

Annual inspections and tests were completed for the fire alarm/sprinkler/hydrant, fire extinguishers, post indicator valve and backflow, elevator and stage lifts, kitchen hoods and fire systems, bathroom hardware, and preventative maintenance on sewers. Weed abatement and pest control is monitored and performed. Every room receives deep cleaning in the summer. Preventative maintenance is performed on all HVAC units. Playgrounds are inspected annually and any necessary repairs are completed and new sand is applied.

Every morning before school begins, the day custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One Day custodian and one evening custodian are assigned to Saratoga Elementary School. The day custodian is responsible for general grounds maintenance, cleaning the restrooms, multi-purpose room, trash removal, and preparing the school for opening. The evening custodian is responsible for cleaning the classrooms and trash removal.

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021.
